Jicarilla Apache is an Eastern Apachean language from the Athabaskan family of North American languages.

Recordings are of Merton Sandoval who is from Dulce, New Mexico.

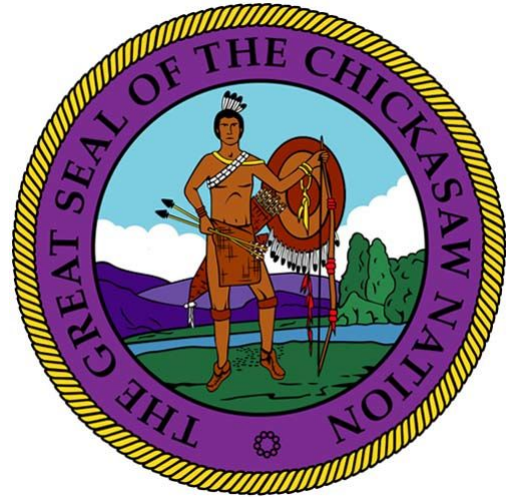


Chickasaw

Chickasaw is a Muskogean language spoken in south-central Oklahoma.

Ja'a Kumiai

Kumiai is an endangered Yuman language of the Delta-California subgroup spoken across the Mexico–US border by approximately 150 people.

The variety heard in these recordings is from Juntas de Neji, Mexico.

Spokane

Spokane, Kalispel, and Montana Salish, are nearly identical dialects of an Interior Salish language spoken in Eastern Washington and Western Montana.

The data heard here were provided by Alex Sherwood, a speaker of Kalispel from the Chewelah Indian Reservation.

Mono Lake (Kootzaduka'a) Northern Paiute

Northern Paiute is a member of the Numic branch of the Uto-Aztecan language family. It is spoken across the Great Basin in the western United States.

This recording comes from a single female speaker, born in 1921, who learned Mono Lake (Kootzaduka'a) Northern Paiute alongside English in her childhood.

Nuuchahnulth [nu:tʃa:ʔnuʈ]

Nuuchahnulth is a Wakashan language spoken by people living on the west coast of Vancouver Island in British Columbia, Canada.

These recordings were provided by Katie Fraser, who spoke her language regularly in her family and community while growing up on Flores Island, BC in the 1940s and 1950s.
